

#### Grand Knight's Message



September is going to be a busy month for the Knights. In addition to our recurring events such as the Pro-Life Vigil, Divine Mercy Chaplet and Rosary, Agape Meal, and Wednesday night Bingo, we have the MS Bike Deception Pass Classic on Saturday, Sept. 6<sup>th</sup>, Cor on Tuesday, Sept. 23<sup>rd</sup>, and the "Planting Seeds" Vocations Retreat on Saturday, Sept. 27<sup>th</sup>. St. Augustine's First Sunday Breakfast returns on Sunday, Sept. 14<sup>th</sup>.

Speaking of Cor, our first session consisted of a short intro where we spoke about ourselves. A viewing of a short video about masculinity with spirited discussions about men we respect and the reasons that why we respect them; what obstacles are there in today's society that prevent boys from becoming men; and what

happened in our lives that helped us obtain a better understanding of what it means to be a man. I am looking forward to our second session where we will discuss brotherhood.

Every night, the KofC Pacific Field Agents sponsor a 30-minute video discussing different topics each night. They have videos on Long Term Care, Insurance for your Grandkids, Your Fraternal Benefits, Investments Aligned with Our Faith, and Field Agent Career. While they have a video schedule on what's to be shown each night, I did not find the schedule to be completely accurate; during the week that I watched these videos. Some videos were shown on different nights.

Each video has a short intro on the specific topic which presents general information. Following the video, you are asked to complete a short survey asking who you are and what topics interest you. Once you view a video, please fill out the survey so that the Council can receive credit. You will receive an email afterwards saying your Fraternal Benefits Advisor, Brother Michael Schwab, may contact you.

You might think, why should I watch these videos or am I comfortable with the insurance policies I have. Did you know that the Knights of Columbus has the following:

- 1. Benefits for the children of insured members that include guaranteed issue insurability for children that are less than eighteen years old; or,
- 2. College scholarships for members, their spouses, and their children; or,
- 3. You can make financial arrangements to support your church, seminarians, or charitable organizations of your choice; or,
- 4. The Knights of Columbus will pay benefits upon the death of a member or his spouse as the result of Injury sustained in a covered accident?

While I hope a fatal accident never occurs to anybody, it is comforting to know these benefits can be given, at no cost, to all members and their wives. Protection is on a 24-hour basis for accidents that may occur anywhere in the world during activities that may be either on or off work, while on business, pleasure, vacation, or at home (except for what is excluded). If you do not know about it, you most likely won't ask about it. Watching these short videos may provide you with something you may find useful.


#### Installation of Fr. John E. O'Brien Council Officers

### Knights in Action: Restoring St. Augustine's Church Cross

A Chronicle of Faith, Service, and Community

The "Dynamic Duo", once again answered the call to service, leaving a profound mark not just on the church's physical landscape, but on the hearts of all who bear witness to their deeds.

Brother Knights Ralph Byars, our District Deputy, and Francis Bagarella, Past Grand Knight, whose tireless efforts have become synonymous with the spirit of service that defines the order. When Father Chris, the parish's pastor, set forth a vision for church improvements, Ralph and Francis immediately stepped forward to fulfill yet another of his projects with characteristic zeal.

At the heart of this endeavor was the church's Cross—a symbol of faith, endurance, and sacred tradition. Over the years, the Cross had silently weathered the elements, its presence steadfast but its visage faded, overlooked amid the hustle of daily life. Recognizing the importance of its restoration, Ralph and Francis devised a plan to breathe new life into the cherished icon.

Their task was twofold: to clean the cross of accumulated grime and dust, and to lay upon it a fresh coat of paint, restoring its gleaming beauty and spiritual resonance. The only costs incurred were for delivery and pickup—a testament to the goodwill that flourishes when purpose unites people.

Brother Knights Ralph Byars and Francis Bagarella is a celebration of what can be achieved when compassion and faith guide our actions. Through their work, St. Augustine's Church Cross has been restored to its rightful brilliance, standing as a visible sign of hope and unity.

St. Augustine's Cross now gleams against the sky, a beacon for all who seek comfort, guidance, and inspiration. The parishioners' admiration and appreciation serve as a reminder that even the simplest acts of service can resonate deeply, touching hearts and inspiring gratitude.

The Cross, radiant in its renewed beauty, now stands not only as a symbol of faith but as a monument to the unity, generosity, and devotion of the parish community.

#### **COR Training Recap: Masculinity**

Our COR training session explored the theme of authentic masculinity rooted in Catholic virtues. We discussed how true masculinity reflects strength, sacrifice, and service, drawing inspiration from Christ's example as a servant leader. Key points included:

**Faith and Virtue**: Embracing courage, humility, and integrity as men of God **Brotherhood**: Strengthening our bonds as Knights to support one another in living out our faith **Leadership**: Taking responsibility in our families, parish, and community to model Christ-like masculinity

The session included prayer, reflection, and group discussions, fostering a deeper understanding of our roles as Catholic men. Thank you to all who attended and contributed to the meaningful dialogue.

#### Saint Michael Prayer Summary

The St. Michael Prayer, composed by Pope Leo XIII in 1886, is a powerful invocation for spiritual protection and strength. Recited during our training, it reminds us of our call to stand firm against evil and seek God's guidance.

#### St. Micheal the Archangel Prayer

St. Michael the Archangel, defend us in battle. Be our protection against the wickedness and snares of the devil. May God rebuke him, we humbly pray; and do thou, O Prince of the Heavenly Host, by the power of God, cast into hell Satan and all the evil spirits who prowl about the world seeking the ruin of souls. Amen.

#### **Key Themes:**

**Spiritual Warfare**: St. Michael, leader of the heavenly armies, prayer calls to protect us from evil forces **Humility and Trust**: We rely on God's power, through St. Michael, to overcome temptation and sin **Vigilance**: Emphasizes our need to stay alert against spiritual dangers in our daily lives

This prayer deeply aligns with our Knights' mission to defend our faith and serve our community with courage. Let's keep praying regularly, both individually and as a council, to find strength and protection in our efforts.


Mike's contributions are invaluable. His dedication and hands-on approach are a testament to his character, making him an exemplary Knight and a respected member of any team he joins.

#### **Our Lady of the Assumption Catholic Church** -- by Rusty Waters

A New Spiritual Home in the Peshastin Valley

During a recent glamping "glamorous camping" trip to the Leavenworth area, our stay included two Sundays and the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The first Sunday we attended Mass at Our Lady of the Assumption in Cashmere. We found the pews near their capacity but found seating in the choir loft. Lo and behold, I found myself sitting next PSD Kim Washburn, one the cantors... another story.

During Mass announcements, Fr. Miguel González announced the church picnic will be held on the new church grounds of Our Lady of the Assumption and all parishioners and visitors are invited.

Nestled in the verdant heart of the Peshastin valley, the newly constructed Our Lady of the Assumption Catholic Church stands as a beacon of faith and fellowship. Surrounded by flourishing rows of pear orchards, the church grounds offer both a sanctuary of quietude and a canvas for community gatherings. Against this picturesque backdrop, parishioners recently gathered under an afternoon of clear skies and sun for the annual church picnic—a cherished event that ushered in new memories, forged friendships, and celebrated the spirit of togetherness.

The sunny day cast a glow over the ground beside the new rectory, where laughter and the scent of sizzling

fare mingled in the air.

Our Lady of the Assumption Council #13597 (Robin Radach - Grand Knight), true to their tradition of service, manned the grills with dedication, carefully flipping hamburgers and turning hot dogs until they reached smoky perfection topped with a complement of sliced cheese, crisp lettuce, sliced tomatoes, onions, and pickles. Their aprons bore the marks of honest labor, and their smiles spoke of camaraderie and joy.

Fellow parishioners grilled tortillas, ground meat, onions, serrano peppers with other "fixins" like guacamole sauce and a parade of spicy sauces, fragrant cilantro, lime quarters — added color and zest, inviting everyone to build a plate as unique as themselves.







Children darted between picnic tables, their laughter punctuating the soft hum of conversation. Neighbors, both familiar and newly met, exchanged stories and blessings beneath the shade of erected tents, the trees, or anything that would provide shade from the Sun. The sense of community was palpable — a tapestry woven from shared faith and simple pleasures.

What truly sets the event apart was the warmth that radiated not just from the afternoon summer weather, but from every handshake, every helping hand, and every generous serving. By late afternoon's end, hearts and appetites were equally satisfied, and the promise of future gatherings was left glowing on every face.













Many of you may have visited the Leavenworth area in the past and maybe even attended Mass in either Leavenworth or Cashmere to fulfill Sunday obligations. Available then, was either Our Lady of the Snows in Leavenworth or St. Francis Xavier in Cashmere. In 2017, the Yakima Diocese merged Our Lady of the Snows and St. Francis Xavier parishes into a united church -- Our Lady of the Assumption.

In March 2025, Our Lady of the Assumption broke ground for a new church amidst a pear orchard in the Peshastin valley. Currently, the church is in its final stages of being finished. The new Our Lady of the Assumption church held its dedication last month on the Vigil of the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Situated at the US 2 & US 97 interchange and just off Jeske Road, the church is both physically and symbolically central. Peshastin, located between Leavenworth and Cashmere makes it a natural gathering place. The church's presence in the valley not only honors the history of its predecessor parishes but also signals a flourishing future, rooted in community and faith.

Parishioners and visitors alike are welcomed. At the entrance, inscribed above the entrance are the words, in Latin, "DOMUS DEI ET PORTA COELI" which translates "The House of God and the Gate to Heaven."

What I viewed inside is magnificently awesome!

Stepping inside, you are greeted by a scene of breathtaking reverence. The Italian marble altar and ambo gleam with quiet grandeur, their smooth surfaces reflecting the valley sunlight that streams through stained glass. Overhead, a constellation of radiant lights evokes the stars themselves—symbols of heaven's promise, casting gentle illumination upon those who gather, inviting each soul to rise and seek the divine. The interplay of stone, light, and sacred intention transforms the sanctuary into a place where awe and peace dwell side by side, inspiring all who enter to lift their hearts in gratitude and wonder.










At the heart of this sacred space, the altar awaits a relic of St. Maria Goretti, whose legacy as the <u>Patron Saint of Victims of Rape</u> brings a profound resonance of hope and healing. As shared by Fr. Miguel González, this cherished relic will rest within the altar, infusing the sanctuary with an invisible thread of courage and compassion — an emblem of faith that endures even in the face of suffering.

Adorning the walls, the Stations of the Cross — once a solemn presence in Our Lady of the Snows — now find renewed purpose amid the church's tranquil surroundings. Their motifs have been lovingly reimagined, blending scenes of devotion to the beauty of the church, so that each step along the way of sorrows becomes a journey through both spiritual reflection and the gentle embrace of the land. In these details, the church's story is forever entwined with the lives of its people, offering solace, unity, and inspiration for years to come.























Another story...

There are moments in life when chance meetings become more than mere coincidences, transforming into meaningful encounters that linger in the mind long after the event has passed. Such was the case when I found myself sitting next to Kim Washburn, Past State Deputy (PSD) and a distinguished member of Council #13597, during a service at Our Lady of the Assumption. It was not my first meeting with PSD Kim Washburn; our paths had previously crossed earlier this year at the WA State Convention, an occasion that offered its own share of inspiration and camaraderie.

Kim is now a WA State Director / Chairmen and directs the Tootsie Roll Program. At the convention, he was referred to as the Tootie Roll Man! The Tootsie Roll Program, officially known as the Campaign for People with Intellectual Disabilities, raises funds primarily to support local and state-level programs that assist individuals with intellectual and physical disabilities.



The moment had lighthearted energy, as everyone at the tables shared a laugh and some friendly banter with Kim. It was clear that his enthusiasm for the cause was infectious; not a single person could resist the charm of the "Tootsie Roll Man" or the sweetness of his mission. By the end of the evening, Kim's efforts not only helped bolster the campaign's fundraising totals but also brought a sense of camaraderie and shared purpose to the group. It was a small but memorable episode that highlighted both the generosity of the members and the uplifting spirit at the heart of the convention.

As I look back on my conversations and shared moments with Kim Washburn, I am grateful for the opportunity to witness firsthand the positive influence of dedicated community leaders. The example set by Kim — through leadership, council membership, and musical ministry — serves as an inspiration not only to Knights but to all who value faith and fellowship.



#### **Mass Etiquette**

Entering the church is not just a building, but a sacred space set aside for worship, prayer, and reflection. Upon entering, parishioners are encouraged to recognize the presence of the Blessed Sacrament and the atmosphere of holiness. The Church teaches that silence in the nave (the central part of the church) is especially important, as many may be preparing for Mass through private prayer, reflection, or confession.

While Users extend a warm welcome to all who enter, it is important to help foster an atmosphere of quiet reverence, especially within the nave. Those greeting parishioners may gently remind arriving guests to keep conversations low or move them to the vestibule, thus ensuring that the sacred silence is preserved for those already gathered in prayerful preparation. In this way, hospitality and attentiveness work hand in hand, creating a sanctuary where all can encounter peace before the celebration of the Mass begins.
